WELCOME to the ACDV B78 basic skills math course. It is my goal to help you build your fraction and decimal computation and problem-solving skills, along with improving your general college study skills. I hope you enjoy the journey! Course Description: This course is designed for students whose math placement tests indicate they are not ready for Math 50. This course emphasizes a review of the operations of whole numbers, fractions, decimals, and percents.

## Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Demonstrate proficiency in simple addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of whole numbers.
2. Compare, reduce, add, subtract, multiply, and divide proper fractions, improper fractions, and mixed numbers.
3. Compare, add, subtract, and multiply, and divide decimals.
4. Convert fractions to decimals and decimals to fractions.

The first time you score $100 \%$ on these weekly quizzes, you will earn 10 extra credit points ( 20 total).

## COURSE WORK:

A. Daily in-class activities: We meet two times each week for sixteen weeks. In-class workbook usage, discussion, small group instruction, and individual work and teamwork are required and expected.
B. Homework: Plan on two hours outside of class per class hour (6 hours/week). Homework must be completed before coming to class. Homework assignments are reviewed at the beginning of class periods. Homework will be collected and graded on a credit/no credit basis. Ten (10) points will be given for each collected homework assignment if all assigned problems were solved correctly. You must show your work in order to receive credit.
F. Quizzes and Tests: Quizzes and tests vary by point value based on how many problems are given on the test. Your class grade is determined on a total point value system. Quizzes are $40 \%$ of your class grade. Due to the weight of the final exam, you must pass the final with a C or better to pass the class.

Grading scale: $90 \%=\mathrm{A} ; 80 \%=\mathrm{B} ; 70 \%=\mathrm{C} ; 60 \%=\mathrm{D} ;$ below $60 \%=\mathrm{F}($ Passing grade is a "C".)
G. Make-up Quizzes: You may make up only one missed quiz or one quiz with the lowest points earned. Make-up quizzes are given on only one pre-determined day at the end of the semester. The makeup date will be announced toward the end of the semester.
H. Late Homework: In order to succeed in this class, it is very important that you complete your homework on time and do not fall behind; therefore, no late homework will be accepted!

Reducing fractions, identifying forms of fractions, raising to highest terms, changing improper fractions and mixed fractions, adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing fractions.
Weeks 8-12: Decimals
Writing, reading, changing, comparing, adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing decimals
Weeks 13-15: Simple Percents, Review, Make-up quizzes
Week 16: Final Exam (May 10 10:00-11:50 AM)
